This team Mathematical Olympiad is an international competition requiring the team to write out full proofs to 5 problems within 3 hours. We came 1st in the country and 12th globally which is a fantastic result considering the age of the students in our team.













Leadership Day '23

Blundell's held the first Year 12 Leadership conference, welcoming pupils from 5 other schools. The day included a session of exploring personality traits through Disk Profiling as well as working in teams that focused on communication skills, how to be inclusive as a leader and how to resolve conflict. The Conference ended with a talk from the Head, consolidating and reflecting on the key ideas from the day's sessions.







Careers Fair

We were delighted to hold our first Careers Fair at Blundell's in quite some years, with a focus on pathways into careers in business, law and finance, which are accessible to students from a vast range of subject specialisms. This was an opportunity for our students, and for those from surrounding schools, to learn more about careers they may never have thought about and to widen their knowledge and understanding of the skills employers look for and the range of courses that can be studied in higher education. Our 21 stands spanned opportunities in Finance, Law, Marketing, Recruitment, IT &Cyber, Surveying, Construction, Real Estate, Planning, Auctioneers, Business Schools, Cookery Courses with universities Bath, Exeter, Cardiff and Reading sharing information about all their courses. We are very appreciative of all the time given by our exhibitors and for them to share their expertise.



Degree Apprenticeship Event

Our Year 12 attended a talk on Degree Apprenticeships where they had an opportunity to learn more about the options available, to support decision making when choosing a pathway after Blundell's. The event was headlined by Savills, who have been rated 1 in the Top 100 Apprenticeship Employers in the RateMyApprenticeship awards 2022. Employability Day

The programme was led by 19 young Enterprise volunteers and employers sharing their collective career experience in Finance, Cyber security, Property development, NHS, Humanitarian Aid, Engineering, Community partnerships, Law & insurance litigation, Entrepreneurship, Project management, Arts education, Architecture and Education.



Mock Trial

8 of our students attended the Exeter University Law Society 'Mock Trial' at the Maynard School. This was a hands-on opportunity for students to explore the workings of the criminal justice system, taking their place as prosecution or defence barristers, to cross examine witnesses and sample what it's like to be a member of a jury, all under the guidance of Exeter University undergraduates. Our Blundell's students got fully involved making the most of the opportunity, with Ruby, Isobel, and Cecily taking on key roles as the defendant, a witness and defence barrister respectively.



Learn2Live



TIVERTON PANNIER MARKET







a major challenge of being a jockey and so I take no race for granted and am enjoying every minute of it."



John Allen (OH 1960-65)

An excerpt from The Australian, April 29, 2022 "He's worked with Prime Ministers, Premiers, top bureaucrats, chief executives and big-name company directors. Over the past 30 years, literally as a one-manband, John Allen has been the head-hunter of choice for some of the most powerful figures in the land as his Melbourne-based executive search firm completed over 500 top level executive and board appointments. John Allen & Associates has also completed 40 appointments of listed company directors, most of whom have been leading businesswomen. In the sporting field the firm has advised on CEO appointments for the Western Bulldogs AFL club, the Melbourne Racing Club and made a key executive appointment for Cricket Australia after the 2011 Argus Report.

But as he celebrates his 75th birthday on April 30, he has decided the time is right to spend more time with his beloved wife Virginia at their home on Victoria's Mornington Peninsula. The doors of John Allen & Associates are now officially closed, the trigger being two life-changing health crises suffered by its sole principal during the Covid-19 pandemic. The first led to heart surgery in March 2020. The second, on February 27 last year, was a sudden stomach upset that became life-threatening and he was in hospital for four days. If the ambulance that eventually attended to him that night after dinner at a friend's house in Dromana had been 30 minutes later, his doctors believe he would not have made it.

Over the decades Allen has also been labelled a "ten-pound Pom", largely the creation of old

arch-rivals in his ultra-competitive profession He was in fact born and raised for 17 years in South India by his English tea planter father and third-generation Adelaide-born mother. His memories of happy childhood years in India with regular ship voyages to Australia are reinforced by his father's 8 mm cine films and other mementos he still has, including a 1.96m King Cobra perfect skin caught and poisoned by his father in 1929. Allen's semi-regal English accent draws from his school education in Sussex and Devonshire in England and university in London before starting his business career there (he is now an honorary life member of the Australian British Chamber of Commerce). After securing an MBA from INSEAD in France in 1976, he moved to Sydney in 1979 and in 1982 was hired by Spencer Stuart & Associates in Melbourne."
