The Spring Term has flown by in a haze of rain and general greyness! It has been an immense term filled with great events. On the cultural front our annual Spring Concert brought us choral and orchestral music of the highest order. It was more than a concert, it was a showpiece of musicality and performance at Blundell's and it was a privilege to sit in Big School, mesmerised by the talent, skill and industry of pupils from the Prep and Senior Schools. That was followed up by a performance of Vivaldi's Gloria and Tippett's Spirituals in a beautifully lit chapel. It was a performance of exceptional quality, and it is no surprise that the Chapel Choir are being given the opportunity to sing Evensong in some magnificent settings. This term they have sung in Bath Abbey and in the Exeter University Chapel. In July they will sing Evensong in Westminster Abbey - more to come on that. The senior Octet achieved a Blundell's first by winning their way to the final round of the National Pro Corda Chamber Music competition to round off a very impressive term of music.

School House put on a performance of 'We Will Rock You' and we were well entertained as Ondaatje Hall Theatre was filled with iconic Queen music. There is some very serious musical theatre talent coming up through the school and we look forward to more on that front in time to come.

And then finally, on the sporting front, we were delighted to be able to send 7 teams to Rosslyn Park. I think we may well have been the only school to have so many teams and with 3 girls' teams on show. It certainly was the moment to add Girls' Rugby to our already strong rugby reputation. Sport is as much about participation as it is about results, and much as we like winning, this statistic makes me as proud as any trophy cabinet could: on any given Saturday this term, we managed to field (in the U18 age group alone) 6 senior netball teams, 4 senior boys' hockey teams, and 3 senior boys' football teams. In terms of elite performance, the U13 boys' hockey team placed 3rd nationally for the second year running again picking up some impressive scalps along the way. To make it to the finals day in Nottingham is an achievement, to have done it two years running made us the only team to do so in the past two years. The XV-a-side rugby team were also the only side in the final 4 nationally to have been represented in the semi-final round a year ago. Last year we lost narrowly to Trinity, and this year we were well beaten by a strong Harrow team. To be in the final 4 two years running is exceptional when you see the scale of the competition.

And so, our little school in Devon continues the tradition of punching well above its weight. The ambition and skill of staff in guiding our talented and committed pupils is what makes Blundell's what and who we are, and I am full of admiration for both staff and pupils for what they are able to achieve. There is so much to be proud of.

DURER COMPETITION

t the end of the Autumn term, Ed, Anastasiia and Freya competed in the International Durer competition, a Team Maths Olympiad with challenging problems designed to challenge top students across the world. Globally there were a total of 83 teams and our students did exceptionally well to secure 2nd place amongst the other 83 teams. They should all be very proud of their accomplishments.

SENIOR MATHS CHALLENGE

any of our pupils performed brilliantly in the Senior Maths _Challenge, and so were invited to the follow-on rounds; the Senior Kangaroo and Round 1 of the British Maths Olympiad. Well done to Jeremy, who attained a certificate of a Merit in the Kangaroo; placing him in the top 25% of all qualifiers. In the Maths Olympiad, Ed and Anastasiia attained distinctions and have qualified for the Math Olympiad Round 2.

arlier this term we received the → results for Round 2 of the British Mathematical Olympiad. Ed and Anastasiia qualified for this after scoring in the top 100 in the country of all pupils up the age of 18 in the first round of the British Maths Olympiad back in November. In Round 2, Anastasiia attained a certificate of merit, a fantastic result considering she is only in Year 10.

The teams were comprised of Year 10's and Year 11's. INTERMEDIATE MATHS CHALLENGE



We had another fantastic set of results, with a new school record of 11 Gold, 22 Silver and 39 Bronze Awards. Gold award winners were Ed, Henry, Anastasiia, Eunseo, Will, Elsie, Dario, Vera, Myrtle, Sujin and Henry. Ed was best in school, and he and Henry qualified for the Maclaurin Olympiad, with the other Gold winner qualifying for the Kangaroo follow on rounds.

PROFESSOR BRIAN COX TRIP

Defore half term, fourteen students om across Years 10-13 travelled D to Torquay's Princess Theatre to watch Professor Brian Cox, the English physicist and musician, deliver his sell-out Horizons lecture. Although the theatre seated 1500, the students had fantastic seats right at the front that enabled them to feel that they could have been receiving a private lecture from the television and radio personality. Professor Cox used a stunning cinematic backdrop behind him to illustrate many subjects such as the nature of time and space, what happens when you cross over the event horizon in a black hole and the likelihood of other intelligent species being out there in the vastness of the universe. Although a significant proportion of the theatre was left scratching heads trying to fathom some of the complexity of the cutting-edge theories being described, many of our students kept up for the full two and a half hours of heavy-duty content.As Professor Cox noted several times, many tens of hours of university lectures were being condensed into bitesize chunks, and whilst we could all

A LEVEL BIOLOGY PRACTICAL

ur Year 13 A level Biologists conducted a university level procedure to genetically modify E. coli bacteria to make them fluoresce. This involved using plasmid vectors with genes originally isolated from jellyfish for green and blue fluorescence protein. The pupils also controlled the expression of this gene in the transformed bacteria by using the reagent Isopropyl-ß-D-thiogalactopyranoside, which acts on the lac operon.

SCIENCE OLYMPIADS

he British Physics Olympiad team at the University of Oxford have been busy keeping our students challenged throughout this term. The highlight was receiving results for the toughest challenge, known as the British Physics Olympiad Round 1. Aimed at Year 13, pupils across Years 11-13 sat this two and a half hour marathon at the end of last term and we were pleased to see Mengyan in Year 13 and Ed in Year 11 achieve Gold awards placing them amongst the top 16% of the best physicists in the country. Beyond this, five further competitions in astronomy and physics took place across Years 10-13, with over 26 students taking part in at least one of the competitions. All students gave their all to tackle the really demanding questions and should all be congratulated for taking part.



BATH UNIVERSITY SPORTS TRAINING VILLAGE

23rd February the Phoenix Society and sport scholars went on a trip to Bath University Sports Training Village. Students participated in field testing, using equipment such speed gates to measure their pace and strength. Students got to experience sports science in action with a visit to a lab to do a VO2 max test on a treadmill, using software to measure heart rate and oxygen levels. We took a tour of athlete facilities, including those used by elite and GB athletes, and went to a lecture on the processes and research around altitude training. It was a fascinating day, and a great time was had by all!

Friday we were delighted to welcome 45 exhibitors including local and international employers and universities)

to our Blundell's School Careers Fair. In the region of 400 students attended. including students from Blundell's and our surrounding schools (Tiverton High School, Cullompton Community College, Uffculme School, Richard Huish College, Exeter College, The Maynard School, Wellington School and their supporters).

SIDMOUTH OBSERVATORY TRIP

arlier this term, 17 students from ✓ across Years 9-13 braved the subzero temperatures to visit the Norman Lockyer Observatory in Sidmouth. This astronomy observation site perched high on a hill above the town has had a fascinating past dating back to the 1900s. Our students were welcomed by two members of the society who gave a short talk about the life of Sir Norman Lockyer and the history of the observatory. After the talk the students had the opportunity to get to know the night sky in their planetarium. With a thorough understanding of where particular constellations and important stars lay in the sky and how the night sky varies depending on where you observe it from, the students then made their way outside to tour the three large refractor telescopes and the more modern 20" reflector telescopes that the observatory has on site. Our students had their eyes opened to the wide range of scientific opportunity in astronomy and all seemed to take their own piece of interest away from the visit. BIOLOGY OLYMPIAD

he best 15,000 students from 900 schools worldwide took part in this year's British Biology Olympiad. This is the hardest and most prestigious school biology competition. The top 5% gained Gold, 10% Silver and 15% Bronze with only 34% of the schools having a Gold medal winner.


