At this time of the year, the school's festive season, I am always in awe of the many ways in which our staff and children respond to the challenge of putting on seven different Christmas productions, all whilst still working hard in the classroom, on the games field, in Music and in Art, as well as the 101 other things that they do. It is extraordinary and yet year in, year out, the children walk on to the stage and perform with such courage and confidence, delighting each and every audience as they sit enjoying their coffee and mince pies. I have had the privilege of watching some of our very youngest Nursery children take to the stage for the very first time, nerves clearly visible and desperately looking to

see Mummy or Daddy in the audience. The smiling and waving when eye contact is made is always a joy to see and often gives the little bit of reassurance needed to stand up and say their lines. As the years go by, each child's confidence grows and the culmination for many of our pupils is the Year 6 production in the Ondaatje Theatre, with make-up, costumes, solo singing performances and microphones in front of an audience of 150+.

Developing that confidence and ability to communicate effectively happens on the stage but also in the day to day lives of the children here at school. It comes from the children feeling safe within their friendship groups and the strength of trusting relationships which they build with their teachers. It comes from high expectations during lessons and the regular reminders in Awards Assemblies, to make eye contact, smile and say "thank you". It comes from giving every child a voice and the chance to share ideas and to listen to others, be that in our action-packed Nursery or in the challenging environment that is an RPS 'Balloon debate.' For some children, standing on the stage comes very naturally and the thought of performing at a Speech and Drama Recital or a Tea and Tunes Concert fills them with excitement. For others, it evokes a very different set of emotions and our goal is to help every child to develop the inner confidence to be brave, to have a go and to realise that they can conquer any fear that they may have.

We all recognise that formal qualifications help children to obtain the keys to open many doors and we want our children to have a variety of different keys at their disposal when they leave school. What we also know is that each of those different doors will require them to have the ability to communicate clearly and with confidence, often for a variety of purposes and certainly to different audiences. What you will read of in the pages that follow is the many ways in which we support the children in being ready to face all that lies beyond their chosen doors, whatever that may be.

My thanks to our editor, Mr Moore, and to all of the teachers and pupils who have worked so hard to put this Autumn edition of the Review together for everyone to enjoy.

I wish you all a happy and healthy 2022.

Blundell's Presents



Strong communication skills are clearly key to successful social interaction with others both inside and outside the classroom, and as such the development of effective speaking and listening skills is fundamental to teaching across the curriculum at Blundell's. Children from across the school will clarify, share, challenge and extend their knowledge and understanding in all lessons on a daily basis through informal 'partner talk' and collaborative small group work; regularly they will be asked to report back to their peers in class on the topic they have been studying, or will take part in more formal debating practice. Children will also take part in assemblies, speaking before a wider audience of peers or parents, and as they grow older and move up through the school, they may be asked to lead visiting parents on tours of the school, lead prayers at chapel services or introduce musical items in concerts; some may even

be invited to address the entire Blundell's community on stage in the marquee at Speech Day. Oratory skills including clear articulation, intonation and projection are taught to all as a matter of course in English lessons, with many opportunities to present 'Talks' on given topics built into the syllabus to provide opportunities for developing confidence and refining technique in public speaking. Drama teaching adds another layer of opportunity and challenge by engaging the children in delivering improvised and scripted performances on a number of levels, from performing a small sketch to

peers in class, to performing full blown plays to a packed house on stage at Ondaatje Theatre. Those with a particular interest may also choose to take Speech and Drama lessons, receiving specialist coaching, performing regular recitals and working their way up through a series of Speech and Drama grades. All of our children, though, are encouraged to fully embrace the challenge of public speaking; for a generation gradually emerging from a period of covid hibernation, the confidence to speak up, boosting self-esteem and oiling the engines of successful social interaction, has never been more important. OUTDOOR LEARNING






