ECO-MATTERS:

GIVING A BLUE PLANET AN EARTHLY CHANCE



Blundell's **ECO-COMMITTEE**

This year our school made the decision to work towards Eco-Schools Green Flag accreditation. Eco-Schools began in 1994 and is the largest educational programme on the planet (there are currently 70 countries delivering the Eco-Schools programme around the world); in England it is operated by the environmental charity Keep Britain Tidy. To have any realistic chance of being successful in promoting environmental action reflecting our green values, all stakeholders at the school would need to give unanimous support to the initiative. We began by opening this up to the pupils, from whom we invited applications for a place on the newly created Blundell's Prep Eco-Committee. The response was huge, indicating from the start the breadth and depth of feeling on this matter across the school.

Once our wonderful Blundell's Prep Eco-Committee had been established as an alliance of representatives from each Form who all shared a common passion for looking after our ailing world, the first action of the committee was to undertake an Environmental Review, involving a series of checks and interviews with children and teachers to identify key areas for our school to focus upon. Using the data collected, we identified these areas to be: waste management, energy consumption and litter control. Subsequent discussion of these matters generated plans and ideas to transform our school by making significant environmental improvements...

Eco-Smart is an ongoing weekly competition launched to find the most environmentally responsible Form by encouraging the switching off of lights when classrooms are not in use during break and lunchtimes, the correct use of recycling bins to manage recycling efficiently in each classroom, and an end to leaving smartboards and other electronic devices switched on — or left on standby mode — when not in use. This initiative has proven to be brilliantly competitive as each Form has been desperate to receive the Eco-Smart Award in a Friday Celebration Assembly, and we hope that everyone will remain committed to becoming more and more energy efficient in the future!

Earth Hour took place as a global opportunity for people across the world to stop and think about things we can all do to help make the Earth a more sustainable environment in which to live and work. At Blundell's, during a computer-free hour of low lighting and reduced energy usage, the Prep School focused on designing plans for an eco-inspired, sustainable Blundell's campus, which really helped the children to reflect upon our energy consumption across the school and how we can make small steps to become more energy efficient in the future.

Eco-Avengers Assembled saw the Eco-Committee determined to share their passionate environmental message by running a series of assemblies for children in the Prep and Pre-Prep, in which they delivered some important information to raise awareness of waste, energy and litter issues, and sought

to inspire others to get involved in supporting plans to protect our planet. As part of this mission, the Eco-Committee informed the school of 'The Great British Spring Clean', an eco-initiative which aimed to encourage everyone to pledge to pick up litter and work together to help keep our environment clean, tidy, fresh and healthy.

Eco-Week made its inaugural appearance in the summer term, when we were incredibly excited to be able to follow a range of ecothemes throughout the week. From exploring ways to protect the marine life in our oceans from plastic pollution, to visiting Exeter's recycling centre to see what recycling looks like in action, from attempting to get through a day at school without using electricity (more difficult than it might sound!) to aquachallenges aimed at highlighting the need for water conservation, everybody threw themselves into all the activities, before finishing the week by signing up to the Blundell's Pledge to Help Protect our Planet – not just for an Earth Hour, or for an Eco-Week, but for every day that we want to enjoy living

Learning more about saving energy or reusing and upcycling waste materials may only be the first steps towards living more sustainably, but they are crucial steps for our future custodians of the planet, who, more than any other generation before them, are coming to understand the enormous responsibility they will shoulder in leading by example a life more in harmony with the interests of the world.

Blundell's ECO-WEEK

The Blundell's Eco-Week was a great way of encouraging everyone to be a little more eco-friendly at school. Everyone from Nursery to Year 6 took part to find out what we can do to help look after our planet.

MONDAY - SAVE OUR OCEANS DAY

On Monday we learned about the terrible impact of plastic pollution in our seas and oceans. Did you know that a plastic bag containing sweet wrappers was discovered at the bottom of the Marianna Trench in the Pacific Ocean, the deepest natural point on the planet? It is thought that approximately 100,000 marine mammals, 100,000 sea turtles and around one million sea birds are killed each year as a result of entanglement or consumption of plastic.

TUESDAY - NO WORKSHEET DAY

On Tuesday we moved towards trying to use as little paper as possible in school. Most people take an average A4 sheet of paper for granted, often screwing it into a ball and tossing it into a bin without a thought for what has gone into making it. Did you know that 42 million trees are cut down every year to make wood or paper products? That is making an awful lot of wildlife homeless for the sake of that disposable sheet of paper.



WEDNESDAY - NO FOOD WASTE DAY

On Wednesday we aimed to generate as little food waste as possible throughout the day. In the UK it is thought that about 9.5 million tonnes of uneaten food is thrown away each year. When some people in the world are dying from malnutrition or starvation because they do not have enough food to eat, this is not a good statistic. At lunchtimes at school we have some choice about how much food we take to eat — but we are encouraged to eat what we take.

THURSDAY - NO TECH DAY

On Thursday we were all wondering how we were going to get through the day without technology, although we knew it was for a good reason. The burning of fossil fuels is still a substantial factor in generating electricity on a large scale; that electricity may power many luxuries in life, but it comes at a price. The generation of electricity from fossil fuels releases a lot of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere — one of the greenhouse gasses

responsible for the climate change having such a dramatic impact on the global environment.

FRIDAY - SAVE WATER DAY

On Friday we tried to use water as efficiently as we could. Fresh water is of course essential to our survival, so with increasing demand at a time when rising temperatures and unpredictable weather patterns can mean more frequent and more severe water shortages, not wasting water has become a high priority. Each year group was put into teams and challenged to transport water across the playground without spilling any. This was not easy, but helped us to understand that we need to look after the natural resources that we have if we wish to avoid going into liquidation as a species...

Sticking with the theme of looking after our often abused environment, Year 1 investigated the catastrophic damage which can be caused to marine life by oil spills at sea. Creating their own artificial oil slick, they could see for themselves the effect of oil on feathers, and how difficult this can be to clean up. Encouraging respect for the world in which we live amongst the

coming generations can only help to oil the wheels of change when it comes to turning from a mindset fixated on plundering, to protecting the planet.





WASTE AWAY

Year 4 were invited to learn all about reducing, re-using and recycling at Exeter's Pinbrook Road Recycling Centre. The education staff set up a series of experiments designed to teach the children about the properties of different materials, and how this knowledge can be used to help sort the different items arriving at the centre from household waste. After lunch we headed to the Viridor Exeter Energy Recovery Facility

WILD EXPLORERS

Our Wild Explorers in Year 3 have been busy looking after our beautiful natural environment at school, and all of nature's creatures who may visit or live there. Our Year 3 Bird Watch in support of the RSPB did not reveal a great number of birds, beyond a few bluetits, but we did enjoy hiding and listening out for birdsong, as well as making bird feeders from recycled milk bottles to leave out for any future wild winged visitors who might descend upon our school grounds. One of the targets for achieving their Wild Explorer Passports was for the children to develop their skills by using the school grounds to organise and run a class project to promote green values. We therefore spent a lot of time gardening in preparation for holding a plant sale, where peas, courgettes, pumpkins, squash, broad beans and more were all available to buy. We had also made bags of seed bombs for people to use in their gardens and green spaces to encourage the growth of wild flowers. The Plant Sale was very well attended, and the money raised was subsequently used to adopt a seed at the Millennium Seed Bank at Kew Gardens, with the intention of protecting a species of plant for generations to come. Beetles, Bugs and Butterflies

Being blessed with such lovely grounds makes it very easy to remember that we are only one species among many sharing such a beautiful common natural ecosystem. The variety of cohabitants on campus is really quite impressive, from Scrabble the dog taking his daily walk across the school fields, to the squirrels and birds nesting in the trees, from the rodents and rabbits making their homes in the hedgerows and the water voles and dormice scurrying down by the riverside, to bats and owls or foxes stealing furtively through the copse and woodlands. Some members of the rich biodiversity of creatures inhabiting the Blundell's microcosm can take more tracking down than others, meaning that in order to appreciate the minibeasts in our midst it can be necessary to organise a bug hunt! Year 3 and Reception children worked wonderfully well together when they teamed up to do just that, hunting high and low in our Wild Wonders area for all kinds of critters and creatures! A further opportunity arose for Year 3 and 4 Eco Club members to search for some of our tiniest friends when they teamed up in Eco Week to create their own Pitfall Traps using yoghurt pots, bananas as bait and leaves and shrubbery to camouflage the traps. The number of beetles, bugs and many-legged visitors attracted in this way afforded the children the chance to examine many often overlooked members of nature's community up close and personal, before, of course, ensuring their safe return to their local habitats. In the Summer Term, children from Year 6 relished the opportunity to visit the Senior School for an Enrichment session led by the Biology Department, in which they got to investigate some slightly less familiar critters in a little greater Scientific depth... Meanwhile, the children in Reception focused their attentions on observing the metamorphic evolution of some of nature's more familiar but most incredible little dwellers, when they took charge of some very tiny caterpillars. The children watched fascinated as they grew bigger each day before finally changing into cocoons. After nearly two weeks of patiently watching and waiting, they were delighted to be able to see the butterflies emerge, dry their wings and start flying around their butterfly pavilion. On a lovely sunny day, just before half term, the children took them outside to release them. Some of the butterflies stayed around them, sitting on their hands and the girls' dresses. Others flew straight off. The children waved goodbye to each of them and were very proud to have successfully taken them from tiny caterpillars to beautiful painted lady butterflies, setting them free to complement the burgeoning population of nature's wild wonders to be found happily living out their lives all across our lovely grounds. SEEING Eye to Eye

Year 6 enjoyed performing an eye dissection as part of their Light project in Science, with the help of Dr. Ratcliffe and some Sixth Formers from the Senior School... We worked in pairs, under the supervision of a Year 12 student, to dissect a cow's eye. To start with, we cut away the muscle surrounding the eye with scissors. Then we cut open the pupil and iris (which was brown) to search inside for the lens (which looked red). We also saw the vitreous humor, a clear jelly-like liquid that came out whenever we squeezed the eye. At the back of the eye, we could see the optic nerve, which would have led to the brain for the visual image to be processed. We also saw a part called the cornea, a white substance which covers the outside of the eye. My favourite part was when we found the lens because I was very proud of myself when I pulled it out of the eye using my tweezers. STEM SELL TECHNOLOGY

PLASTIC MEMORY



WEAVING MAGIC




HOUSE CROSS COUNTRY: MILDREN CUP




